97-year-old is descendent of Fair founder

Smart as a tack, spry and quite engaging, 97-yearold June Fox Mitchell of Brandon remembers the Fair's early beginnings well.

She is descended from of one of the eight original Fair founders and recalls when their family occasionally had trouble getting here because the road was impassa-

"My grandfather was one of the eight founders of the Fair," she said of her grandfather Nathan Fox. "He was a lot of fun."

Her father was born the year the Fair started and Mitchell and her sisters came regularly as children and teenagers when the road was passible. "We just grew up coming to the Fair," she said.

The Fox Den on the Square is Mitchell's third or fourth cabin. Her family's first cabin was a one-room one-story building with a dirt floor. The second version of their cabin, which Mitchell grew up using, had two stories with stairs on the outside of the building, a feature of most Fair cabins at the time.

Mitchell's daughters, Joan Fox Mitchell Caden and Marsha Brockman, shared stories of how the old cabin's second story dividing wall didn't reach the ceiling. That meant that even though the boys and girls were separated at night, there was still some jumping and pillow throwing across the divide.

In those days, Fairgoers didn't have running water. They used a water pump to pump water and bring it back to the cabin for use.

Fairgoers also brought prepared food to their cabins. Mitchell's mother would cook lunches for her children and they would bring their packed lunches out to the Fair

When Mitchell was in charge of the cabin's fare, she brought a roast, a turkey breast and many vegetables and pies. Shaving ears of corn to make cream corn was a favorite activity for everyone in the family.

When National Geographic came to spotlight the Fair in 1980, Mitchell and her family were included in the magazine's photographs, making Mitchell a Fair celebrity.

She has also seen many interesting speakers and performers at the Fair, naming Sonny Montgomery, Ronald Reagan and John Glenn. She remembered taking chairs down to the Racetrack to watch the shows.

"It was the natural thing to do, coming to the Fair," Mitchell said. Her family occasionally had trouble coming, such as when the Fair shut down with World War II, or when the roads weren't good enough to pass onto the Fairgrounds.

But, Mitchell has always done her best to come spend time with her Fox and McKay relatives. This year marks the first time she has been back in four years. "I hope I get to come back next year, too," she said.

Bryan ready for another Late Night Sing 'tonight'

Laura Bryan, the pianist at the Fair's Late Night Sing for the last 50 years, was so overcome with grief last year she sat down at her piano and played all 90 songs that include standards such as "The Yellow Rose of Texas," "My Buddy," and "When the Saints Go Marching In."

While Bryan of the Dobbs Cabin 245 in Sunset Strip likes spending time with family watching her grandchildren enjoy the Fair, her highlight is the Sing, or the A.J. Yates Jr. Memorial Late Night Sing as it is known.

"I'm 75, and I've been coming to the Fair all my life," Bryan said. "Throughout the years, though, playing piano for Late Night Sing is my biggest highlight of the Fair nowadays. I haven't missed a Fair in my lifetime."

Bryan recalled playing piano when she was just 10 years old, and began playing for Late Night Sing after after her aunt could no longer play. Byran's grandmother played for many years as well.

"My aunt told me that 'You cannot play pretty on this piano, and you have to bump

it out so everyone can hear it," Bryan said. "It has been a family tradition for years, and I hope there's someone else in our family that can come along and play after me."

When she isn't playing piano, Bryan resides in the Dobbs Cabin 245, where her sister, her children and grandchildren all stay.

"This cabin was built in 1958," she said. "We don't know exactly who built it, but I do know my dad had someone construct it. I decided to keep my dad's last name, Dobbs, in the cabin's name."

Bryan said along with playing for Late Night Sing, she is also looking forward to visiting with family and friends and watching her grandchildren enjoy the Fair.

"My grandkids were all over the place when they were little, and now that they're teenagers, they have fair friends and do their own thing," she said. "We've got a wonderful street and wonderful friends, some of which I haven't seen since high school. It's like a big family reunion."

"We've had people who dressed up as firefighters, and even had someone who dressed as Super Mario," she said.


Alford said the top three winners will receive cash prizes.

After the band party is done the Barretts get to relax until after the last race on Friday when they begin carving watermelons and passing them out to any children who pass by.



"For me coming to the Fair is about visiting people you only see once a year," Bill said.

"I get to see people from elementary school," Joyce added.

Some of the people they have seen include pageant participants carefully walking in their dresses from their cabin to the competition. Others

Joyce said she remembers sitting on the porch with Aunt Roberta one time when she saw her aunt perk up and yell at a man who was walking by.

"She said 'Marty, Marty Stuart, you get over here.' She has known him since he was a baby," Joyce said with a chuckle. "And he said, 'Yes ma'am' and came right up on the porch."

Bill remembers another famous run-in. He said at least 25 or 30 years ago he was sitting on a porch on the Square with a friend when he saw two boys throwing a football. He remembers commenting on the boys' excellent throwing motion and comfort with the ball. Those boys were Peyton and Eli Manning.

Their grandchildren, cousins Lincoln and Lila Perry, are building a whole new generation of memories and experiences at the Fair.

Lila's first Fair came when she was 11 days old. Bill said he thought that might be a record until he heard a neighbor brought a child to the Fairgrounds from the hospital. She likes the petting



Fair training ground for Jeopardy champ

Elliot Yates of "Wheel of Fortune" and "Jeopardy" fame said he got his competitive start right here on the Fairgrounds.

The four-time "Jeopardy" champion remembers playing games with his friends growing up on the Fairgrounds, whether it was Scrabble or spades or trivia games.

"It was my testing ground," Yates said. "I was so competitive, but luckily I had good friends who put up with it and were good competitors. I literally see the path from winning games here at the Fair to winning in front of Alex Trebek."

Yates calls Cabin 228 in Happy Hollow home one week out of the year, though he grew up playing in his grandparents' cabin on the Square.

He currently lives in San Francisco and works for Google.

When he isn't reminiscing with old friends on the Fairgrounds, Yates travels Europe with the money he wins on TV.

"Wheel of Fortune" was his first game show appearance in 2011, "Who Wants To Be A Millionaire" was his second in 2013, and "Jeopardy" was his third in 2015. He also played in Jeopardy's tournament of champions round.

Most recently, when auditioning for a new game show called "The Chase," Yates put his best and most confident foot forward. He told the casting agents that, unbeknownst to them, he was already on the show. Yates explained that this audition was time for the casting agents to realize he was part of "The Chase" already.

"Apparently it was a good thing to say, because they put me on the season finale and I won \$97,000!" he said.

Yates has his trivia strengths and weaknesses. As a former opera producer, he knows music. Pop culture is in his wheelhouse. Before every game, he texts his brother and asks for sports references he should know. From this most recent show he enjoyed questions that introduced more recent phenoms to the trivia canon, questions such as "What dating app advertises itself as designed to be deleted?"

Says Yates of these pop culture questions, "You get questions about 1800s French author Jules Verne and then drag queens on Broadway in the same show."

Yates' ability to recall European geography, pop culture references, sports statistics, and Broadway musicals is what has made him a game show star in the United States.

Yates traces that talent back to his beginnings with the Fair, to which he returns whenever he can. He has a list of two dozen people he catches up with every year.

"It's like 600 family reunions at once," he said, aptly describing his home for one week in the year.





Former sheriff enjoying quiet time at Fair

Tommy Waddell has been able to relax more during the 2021 Neshoba County Fair than in previous years.

Waddell, who served two terms as Sheriff of Neshoba County, retired at the end of December 2019. This is the first Fair he has not been on call to protect the public.

"The Fair is a little different for me this year," Waddell said. "This is the first Fair that I haven't had to work. And it is the first Fair I have actually stayed here. For the past eight years when I was in office, I might not get home off until daylight. I went home to sleep. I didn't stay here. I left that to my wife and kids.

"I was a game warden for 14 years and I worked every Fair but it was a little different. It was more for public relations. The Mississippi Game and Fish came in and set up a booth to hand out literature about the wildlife, natural resources, state lakes and hunting dates."

Waddell and his wife, Bobbie Kay, stay in Cabin 612 with their family. They usually sleep 10 people but the record is 20.

"It depends on year to year," Bobbie Kay said. "This year, because of our kids' time and work schedule, it is going to be limited. We will stay the entire week but most come and go throughout the week."

Tommy said he has been coming to rhe Fair all his life.

"My wife's family has had this cabin since 1977," Tommy said. "It was the Smith Cabin."

The Waddells have a few traditions.

"Every year, we have chicken spaghetti the first Friday

night of the Fair," Bobbie Kay said. "That is tradition. The rest of the time, we wing it. We eat a couple of watermelons throughout the week."

"My favorite part of the Fair is eating," Tommy said. "We go to the concerts. We are looking forward to seeing HARDY this year. He's a home person. I have been family friends with his parents and grandparents. He has done well.

"You see a lot of people and that is one of the enjoyments. You see friends you haven't seen since the last Fair. People move off and it is sort of like a reunion," Waddell said

"We will go to the political speaking. I am out of the political arena now but we still go and listen. We like the concerts, the beauty pageant and the flea market on Saturday. When our kids were younger, we liked the rides but we have gotten away from that.

Waddell loves to fish and has been doing a lot of that since retiring from office.




Do they ever get tired of the Fair?



SOUTHERN BROCCOLI AND **CAULIFLOWER SALAD**

Prep Time: 25 mins Cook Time: 10 mins

Servings: 12 Ingredients:

1 (12 ounce) package bacon

6 cups broccoli florets

6 cups cauliflower florets

2 cups slivered almonds

1 ½ cups golden raisins

1 cup grated sharp Cheddar

1 medium red onion, finely chopped

2 stalks celery, finely chopped

Dressing:

1 cup mayonnaise

1 cup sour cream

1 (8 ounce) package cream cheese, softened

½ cup white sugar

1/4 cup lemon juice

Place bacon in a large skillet and cook over medium-high heat, turning occasionally, until evenly browned, about 10 minutes. Drain bacon slices on paper towel until cool enough to handle, then chop into small pieces. Place bacon in a very large bowl with broccoli, cauliflower, almonds, raisins, Cheddar cheese, red onions, and celery. Whisk together mayonnaise, sour cream, cream cheese, sugar, and lemon juice in a separate bowl until creamy. Pour over broccoli-cauliflower mixture; stir until well combined. Refrigerate until flavors have melded, at least 30 minutes.
